Spark Walk: Participants will enjoy a 20 to 30 minute walk around the property while holding a topic guided conversation. Topics will be provided to each group before they depart. A group captain will guide the talk. A group secretary can keep notes (nothing too formal, maybe jot down on phone or other device while walking), and a group reporter can write the big insights or take-aways on the designated post-it poster once back at the conference center. Everyone will be encouraged to browse each group's posters.

Blindfold Games: Can you drive a speedy car guided by sound alone? Could you win a race or would you wind up sidelined? Try your hand at Blindfold Racer, one of scores of games from Blindfold Games. The Games were designed to provide visually impaired players of all ages with an opportunity to enjoy audio versions of popular video games. No need for tedious drills or lessons. The Games teach dozens of accessibility skills – sensory efficiency, orientation, mobility, literacy, social interaction, and assistive technology as integrated play. Students can practice and improve on their own while enjoying productive playtime. You'll gain a new respect for everything that can be done without visual input. Can you compete? Start your engines!

Collection Development for Disability Resources Wednesday 9 am – 10 am

Libraries provide essential information to community members on a variety of topic and in this presentation will we address disability resources. According to the CDC (2017) 26% of adults (over 60 million) in the United States have a disability. It is likely that this includes patrons who visit or access your library. This presentation will discuss disability related resources in print and electronic formats that can be added to a library's collection. Patrons who may wish to access this information include the person with a disability, a loved one or friend of these individuals, students, community leaders, or local business owners. Resources include fiction and non-fiction books, medical resources appropriate for healthcare consumers, and home/building modification resources.

Changing Landscape of Accessible Reading

There has been a shift in the way people access information: e-books and the widespread use of graphics to convey information have created a “new normal” for how many people read and learn. While these resources are readily available, too many of them are not accessible to people who have a disability that prevents their use of printed material. As a result, people with disabilities such as vision impairments, physical limitations and severe learning disabilities often face barriers to information. Benetech/Bookshare has partnered both with US and international partners to provide free access to over 700,000 books, periodicals and more to qualified library patrons. In this session participants will hear about some new agreements and opportunities including books available through the Marrakech agreement to provide accessible e-books to their qualified library patrons through a variety of technology platforms in a variety of languages.
